# Mary Dianne Delva Department of Family Medicine Queen's University

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# 1. Philosophy and Development in Teaching

I began part-time clinical teaching in the Department of Family Medicine in 1985 and in 1993 accepted an academic appointment. My responsibilities include resident supervision in my clinical teaching practice, seminar leader and faculty advisor in the postgraduate curriculum in family medicine, undergraduate lecturer, tutor for problem-based learning (PBL), clinical skills preceptor and mentor for undergraduate students and faculty development seminar leader, including the Stanford Clinical Teaching Seminar series for faculty and residents. My leadership responsibilities include Director of Faculty Development, School of Medicine (to November 2004) and director of the PBL curriculum for the School of Medicine. In the past I directed the Medicine in Society (MIS) curriculum, was the site coordinator of the Educating Future Physicians of Ontario Project, Undergraduate Program Director for the Department of Family Medicine and course director for the undergraduate dermatology curriculum. I was chair of the Section of Teachers for the College of Family Physicians of Canada for 3 years. Currently I am chair of the Conjoint Conference on Medical Education planning committee.

The patient-centred approach, central to family medicine, forms the foundation of my learner-centred philosophy of teaching. I believe the relationship with the learner is essential to ensuring that the teacher meets the student's learning needs in a manner most effective for the learner. One-to-one teaching of family medicine residents is the ideal setting for this approach. It allows me to guide acquisition of knowledge and skills individually, to assess attitudes and guide the development of professional behaviours. A supportive, receptive relationship with students is fundamental to the success of this approach. Students are then able to share their learning needs and to honestly discuss their difficulties. I believe the modelling of "finding out" when I "don't know" helps learners develop life-long learning skills. I am privileged to continue to learn with my learners

My leadership goals were influenced by the EFPO project which aimed to "make medical education more responsive to the changing health needs of Ontario society" in all levels of medical education. The Social Accountability of Medical Schools project of the Association of Medical Colleges reinforces these goals. The development of competent caring physicians who are responsive to the needs of society requires involvement of all participants; students, community and teachers to continually develop the curriculum. The students were my strongest allies in promoting change initially. As the director of the MIS curriculum, I was fortunate to have a community member on the committee. Their voices ensured that we grounded our programs in the needs of society. In 1996, Dr. Ron Lees and I introduced community based projects to Queen's Medical School by designing the curriculum and developing partnerships with over 25 community agencies. This program is now in its 10<sup>th</sup> year and continues to inspire students and serve our community.

Faculty development is a cornerstone to an effective medical school. Without the support and encouragement to innovate and improve teaching, a medical school will not achieve its mission. Faculty development in the Department of Family Medicine helped me to understand the potential skills of an effective teacher and led to my appointment as the Director of Faculty Development, first in our department and later in the School of Medicine. Meeting and supporting faculty in their multiple roles as teachers, researchers,

administrators and productive professionals has been very rewarding. It is gratifying that during my term teaching dossiers became required for promotion and tenure decisions, a reflection of the improved recognition and the value placed on teaching.

My personal teaching development began with workshops through the Section of Teachers of Family Medicine. During a year in England, in 1992-93 I had the opportunity to teach new general practice trainers for the Oxford region and appreciate the similarities and differences to our approaches. My lecturing skills were strengthened by the TIPS (teaching improvement project system) course at Queen's and participation with the Instructional Development Centre. Dr. Kelly Skeff and Dr. Georgette Stratos provided important influences during a month-long immersion at Stanford as I became a facilitator for the Stanford Clinical Teaching Course. They are outstanding faculty developers and are committed to training effective clinical teachers. I continue to learn and enjoy the opportunity to offer this course to our faculty and residents.

I am intrigued by the conditions that lead to effective learning in all settings: lecture, PBL, the ambulatory setting, different specialties and in continuing education. As part of an interdisciplinary group (education, psychology, medicine and instructional development) we have investigated approaches to learning, learning strategies and learning in the workplace. I am hopeful that this work will contribute to developing a continuum of conditions that will aid learning from undergraduate medicine to life-long learning. My newest interest has taken me to interprofessional teams and how these function effectively with the goal of helping our learners to become effective team players.

It is clearly an exciting era in medical education and I am fortunate to be a part of it.
