Student experience description: Also spent time at the Kenyatta National Hospital in Nairobi, the Aga Khan Hospital in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, and an AKUH satellite clinic in Morogoro, Tanzania. Learned more about the medical needs and challenges in East Africa and the reasons behind these trends, about East African cross-cultural issues and the social context, and about hospital management from conversations with the COO. Also learned more about medicine in general, and gained a better understanding of what it would be like to live and work in East Africa. Also set up and managed two temporary medical clinics, and developed a healthcare communication protocol in preparation for the visit of His Highness the Aga Khan IV.

Placement safety: Yes, because I took the proper precautions and because I was in one of the safest parts of Nairobi. The hospital area is very safe, and I spent the majority of my time there. Whenever I was in other parts of Nairobi, I was careful to always be with someone else, to avoid being out when it was dark, and to not wear/carry anything of value (e.g. watch, designer shirt, smartphone). I was very cautious and thankfully I personally had no unsafe experiences.
