Student experience description: As an undergraduate medical student, we did a lot of observing at the Matangwe clinic. We were not with a medical doctor, but rather a clinical officer who had 3 years of very specific post-secondary education. The clinic nurse had us helping him with all of the procedures he did and let us assist. At Bondo hospital, the conditions were quite horrendous, and while it was an excellent educational (with a medical doctor who had different opinions compared to the clinical officer) and cultural experience, what we witnessed there was a lot to take in.

Placement safety: Yes for the most part. We were two young females travelling on our own so we were alert at all times. We were also told some stories about the area being unsafe, which was worrisome. **Educational experience (out of 10):** 8

Very religious organization. Planned weekend trips before getting there. Planned safari (leisure trip afterwards) trip at home (versus being conned by the travel agency in Lonely Planet).
