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Summary

Health Quality (HQ) Programs offers graduate level blended online learning for working professionals through the Master of Science in Healthcare Quality (MScHQ) and Doctor of Philosophy in Health Quality (PhDHQ) programs. Each program uses an online learning management system and incorporates two inperson intensive weeks (one week in each year of study for the MScHQ and one week in each term of year one for the PhDHQ) to deliver the courses. A teaching team made up of interdisciplinary faculty members and experts in the field work to educate the students with knowledge and skills needed to lead and become leaders in quality, safety, and patient improvement initiatives.

The Master of Science in Healthcare Quality welcomed 63 new first-year students to Kingston, Ontario for their first intensive week which increased current enrollment to over 110 active students. Over 40 students finished the program and graduated in Fall 2018 with 19 graduands opting to attend the ceremony at Grant Hall at Queen's University. The Health Quality Programs team was also pleased and excited to admit seven (7) students to the first cohort of the Doctor of Philosophy in Health Quality. The new program was formally approved at the beginning of the year and launched in September 2018.



In partnership with the Queen's University Smith School of Business, HQ Programs also offers a dual Master of Science in Health Quality (MScHQ) and Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree. This dual degree program allows students to complete both the MScHQ & MBA on an accelerated course track with the flexibility to complete the individual degrees in any order. The HQ Programs team was pleased to attend the convocation of two (2) new dual degree graduates in Spring 2018.

New marketing and communications initiatives for both prospective students, current students, and alumni were successful with an increased online presence on existing social media channels along with the creation of a LinkedIn account. Social media student takeovers, swag giveaways, and hashtag draws helped increase program interest and engagement with a global audience. A new community space, HQ Connects, was also initiated on Facebook where current students and alumni were invited to join and stay connected with each other and HQ-related content. Faculty and staff members attended numerous conferences this year on behalf of the program for which marketing materials were updated to reflect the introduction of the PhDHQ program.



A team comprised of program leadership, faculty members, supervisors, staff, and stakeholders continue to work together to plan, deliver, support, and administer all aspects of Health Quality Programs. Please join us in celebrating this past year's achievements.

Master of Science in Healthcare Quality

The Master of Science in Healthcare Quality (MScHQ) welcomed 63 first-year students to Kingston, Ontario for HQRS 840 and 55 second-year students for HQRS 846. Both oneweek intensives were held at the Donald Gordon Conference Centre with a blend of lectures, guest speakers, group presentations, site tours, and connecting with peers over breaks and meals.

An updated student community space and new web conferencing software was introduced to improve the delivery of course content and program communications. Staff also implemented new student resources such as a firstyear Q&A webinar and guides to getting started as a student at Queen's University.

Doctor of Philosophy in Health Quality

The Doctor of Philosophy in Health Quality (PhDHQ) was formally approved in early 2018 and accepted its first cohort of students for September 2018. Seven (7) students came to Queen's University campus for their first in-person intensive week in the fall term where they participated in classroom learning, site tours, meetings with their supervisors, and networking opportunities with faculty. They will take part in their second intensive week in January 2019 and complete the remainder of the program online. The launch of the program included the development of new course content, a PhDHQ Student Handbook containing program details, policies, procedures, and academic information, as well as creating teaching assistant positions in the MScHQ program for the PhD students to gain teaching experience.





MScHQ + MBA Dual Degree

The dual Master of Science in Healthcare Quality (MScHQ) and Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree had two (2) students graduate in Spring 2018. Directors from both programs attended the ceremony and were pleased to hood each candidate which provides recognition of their accomplishment in both programs.


One (1) student joined the dual program in Spring 2018. As part of the MScHQ degree requirements, the dual degree candidate completed HQRS 847 in the Spring term before joining both the HQRS 840 and HQRS 846 intensive weeks while completing MBA course requirements. The MBA degree was completed in the Fall 2018 term and the final MScHQ degree requirement will be finished in the Winter 2019 term.



The dual degree program is made possible through a partnership between the Queen's University Health Quality Programs (<u>www.queensu.ca/hqprograms</u>) and the Smith School of Business (<u>https://smith.queensu.ca</u>).

Health Quality Programs continued to develop and implement new marketing and communications initiatives. Highlights include:


Health Quality Programs Brand

Marketing materials such as the HQ logo, program documents, brochures, rack cards, posters, and banners were updated to reflect the new Doctor of Philosophy in Health Quality program and to begin advertising its availability for admission. This also involved a revised conference table set-up plan and revisions to the program website and electronic communications.

Digital Media

HQ Programs continued to grow its online presence on existing social media channels while expanding to include a LinkedIn account. Staff worked on different engagement activities including hashtag draws and guessing how many textbooks were shown in a photo.

This year a second-year MScHQ student pioneered a social media takeover during the HQRS 846 intensive week in which they posted course content, social events, and other student perspectives during the week. Engagement on Twitter increased 3.7% during the student-led social media takeover. During both intensive weeks, students were encouraged to post online using the hashtag #HQtakesYGK and a winner was chosen by random draw on the last day of the course.



Student & Alumni Communications

This year, staff implemented new communications to better engage with current students and alumni of the program. Email templates were developed for the start of the academic year in May to better communicate program and course information to new students. The team produced videos in-house including an admissions FAQ, office tour, two separate MScHQ and PhDHQ intensive week sneak peek videos, and a strategic plan summary.

HQ Program staff hosted three webinars this year. One was held in May for new incoming students to ask questions about the intensive week and what to expect. This afforded a great opportunity to begin to engage with students prior to the in-person course and to address any concerns they may have prior to their arrival in Kingston. Another webinar was held in October when admissions opened to present more information about the MScHQ, tips, timelines, as well as a question-and-answer segment. Finally, staff hosted a dual degree MScHQ + MBA webinar in November to communicate with current MBA students at the Queen's University Smith School of Business and present more information about the MScHQ program. All webinars were recorded and made available to those who were unable to attend.

A private Facebook group was created called 'HQ Connects' aimed at current students and alumni of the programs. Its intention was to serve as an informal community to allow the different cohorts to get to know one another, share content, network, and stay connected after graduation. Staff maintain the group and post HQ content including events, networking opportunities, job postings, and other items of interest.
